The remarkable city career of Aynsworth Thwaites

As soon as Keith started working in London in the early 1980s as a turret clock horologist he became interested in the workmanship and life of Aynsworth Thwaites (1719–1794).


Aynsworth had his business in Clerkenwell and was made a Freeman of the Clockmakers Company in 1751. He was the father of John Thwaites, who in 1815 partnered with George Jeremiah Reed, and the firm became Thwaites & Reed.

Over the years Keith has collected information and been fortunate to have worked on several of his turret clocks giving him a unique insight into the skills of this remarkable man.

Drawing on this knowledge and experience, combined with the use of the remarkable archive in the Guildhall, Keith will discuss the life, clocks and other interesting aspects of the life of Aynsworth Thwaites.
